## *Tips on how to survive the school holidays stress free.*

As the children break up from school, parents and carers are faced with the need to entertain to ensure a calm but stimulating environment. Holidays mean a break from usual routine, children are free to enjoy this time to the full! This can sometimes be difficult at first, even a little chaotic. With some planning, it should hopefully run as smooth as possible.

Ask children what they would like to do and try to incorporate this into the day.

Don't try to fit too much in! It can be just as damaging to over-stimulate, as to under-stimulate.

Children need some quiet time throughout the day. This could be time for self-play or reading.

Arrange play dates. Children love playing with other children and will often play for hours. Having a new face around can help keep children entertained.

Mix variety into the routine. Children have a routine at school where they know what is happening next, so the same goes for the holidays. Try having breakfast and then completing an activity and then having some quiet time before lunch and finish with an afternoon activity.

Bring their imagination to life, create an area in the garden for an adventure, build a den, carry out a bug hunt, have a picnic. Get children involved in planning and preparing their meals, keep those unwanted boxes for arts and crafts, hold a Lego challenge, make train tracks, role play. <https://www.space.admin.cam.ac.uk/activities-children>

Visit the National Trust's Anglesey Abbey a beautiful stately home that's set in stunning parkland. There are plenty of things to see and do at Anglesey Abbey, including exploring the house, visiting the gardens, and taking a boat ride on the lake.

Orange Class have been learning about the polar regions, comparing the human and physical features found there. In art we have been experimenting with weaving techniques using paper and wool. The children were very excited to get their clay sculptures and pots back from Wysing Arts and have painted them ready to bring home! In English, they have been writing cinquains and poems with rhyming couplets. The children are enjoying listening to The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe very much and lots of them are keen to read the other Narnia books independently. In maths, we have been learning about place value and money. In science, we have had great fun experimenting with magnets.

What a busy half term it has been! This week, we painted our clay pots ready to take home. We have also finished our sewing projects. We are very proud of the class - they have put lots of hard work into these and they look fantastic. In PSHE, we have explored online safety and how we are the same but different. In maths, we have continued to explore fractions. We have learnt to recognise different fractions and identify fractions of an amount. We hope you all enjoy the holidays!

We have had a fantastic term in Purple Class and we have really enjoyed learning all about our topic: Earth and Space. This week, Purple Class had an exciting trip to the Institute of Astronomy where we got to see their telescopes and find out more about what researching space really looks like. As part of our Science learning, we have created non-chronological reports all about the Solar System which we hope younger children will be able to learn from. This week in maths, we have been focusing on geometry. We have secured our understanding of perimeter and area, learnt about problem solving with angles and compared regular and irregular polygons. Well done for all your hard work this term Purple Class.

In maths, children have thoroughly enjoyed investigating 3D shapes, delving into their properties and characteristics with enthusiasm. In writing, they've started to individually composed and write simple sentences to express their ideas, ensuring they use a capital letter at the start, finger spaces between the words and a full stop at the end. And of course, it's written in their best writing. And finally, last but not least, they've had an incredibly memorable day at the farm, relishing every moment of hands-on learning and interaction with animals.

Blue Class have had great fun this week creating their moon buggies. They have used a drill and a saw to help them with the axle and steering wheel. In maths we have been measuring length which has also helped us with our DT project.

What an amazing spring term it has been! There have been so many highlights however Burwell House stands out amongst us and the children. It was lovely to spend time with all our class parents last week. We hope that you all got a sense of the progress your children are making and how hard they are working. We have loved writing our gladiator stories and hearing about the 'Rock Status' gladiators held in Roman times. In maths, we have been focusing on the short methods for multiplication and division. They have been incredible and successful at using the manipulatives. They all deserve a good rest ready for the warm weather and summer term.

And just like that, Spring Term has come to a close! Silver Class have worked their socks off, especially in writing. We are seeing more and more progress every time they pick up their pen. This week we've started our discussion based on crime and punishment which has helped them develop some sophistication such as using formal language and passive voice. In maths, we are completing our ratio unit, although we may continue with this just after the holidays. Silver Class were surprised to hear that yeast is a living thing and we used this understanding to conduct an experiment. They were surprised to find that sugar and warm water was the best environment for yeast to grow. In P.E. they LOVED the game King of the Ring where they practised their dribbling, defending and attacking skills. We wish you a restful break and can't wait to see Silver Class back for their final term of their primary career!
